

AMHERST FURNITURE CO. AT 223 CHURCH STREET-1935

— History of Amherst, Ohio — 223 CHURCH STREET

Furniture and beer – mostly beer – has been sold from 223 Church Street ever since the two-story brick building was constructed, which was sometime before 1893.

The current beer-centered venue is Ghost Tree Brewing. Dan Blatt established the business in June 2020. Blatt and his partner, John Rush, have a passion for brewing. Original recipes, including 'Ca\$h After Ten' and 'Coffee Stout,' are brewed in the building. Major renovations were completed,

including the addition of a custom-built smoker. The most important renovation was creating enough space to house a five-barrel brewhouse to brew a variety of pilsners, lagers, and Belgian-style beers. The brewery has become well known for its creative pizzas, salads, and subs. As Dan Blatt points out, the motto for the Ghost Tree Brewery is "celebrating community, craft, and culture."

The first known use of the building is the Amherst Furniture store, which opened in 1892. Edward C. Schuler was the manager until October 1895. The company was a first-class furniture business; however, it would soon close in 1897. The Quarryman's Supply Store leased the building from Mr. Horace G. Redington in 1897 and remained until 1918, selling supplies useful for the many quarries in the area.

In 1921, the Amherst Furniture Company moved to this location, with Walter Moebius as manager. He managed the business until 1928 when his brother, Edward, took over and stayed until 1961. The store closed in 1968. The Knights of Columbus were located there until 1973. The next tenant was a Veterans of Foreign Wars post (VFW) that operated there 1975-1987, when the members moved to their new club on Cleveland Avenue.

In 1987 Neil Dunfee opened his bar and deli, calling it Dunfee's Comedy Night Club Bar & Deli. As a tavern owner, Dunfee believed that his new bar would enhance evening traffic for all of Amherst's businesses. The bar included dance facilities and had a reputation for serving great food and an assortment of beer and liquor. Dunfee's closed in 2001. Continuing the tradition of serving beer, Joe's Brewhouse had the location from 2001-2004, followed by R.C's Brewhouse from 2004-2020.

The Miller Family Offered a Helping Hand During the Great Depression

Norman B. Miller and Edna Miller, grandparents of Norm Miller, would give attention to the travelling hobos of the time since the New York Central Railroad cut through the center of their farm. This gave many a man an opportunity for work, a meal, and clothing and shoe repair. Those

who were fortunate enough to spend a minute or two in the blacksmith shop would have the chance to have a snort of Applejack, which Norman had learned to make during Prohibition. He had a license to make vinegar, and it would often turn into hard cider.

Edna had a sewing machine that was always ready to patch and sew clothing for hobos passing through. Norman would repair worn shoes using cast-off refrigerator belting that had gone around the axles driving the refrigerator cars. This belting would break and fall off along the train tracks. He would cut the belting into small pieces, then use them to resole and reheel shoes. This was done for hobos, who would help the Millers on the farm as payment for their labors as they were passing along the nation's byways.

Like many other people in the Amherst area, the Millers were goodhearted people during a very difficult time. They cared for others even though times were tough for them as well. Norman (or Buck Miller as he was called) would often say, "The best thing you can do in life is to help your fellow man. And also, the best place to find a helping hand is at the end of your own arm."

"Jack Armstrong", the All-American Boy, **"Little Orphan Annie"** with Daddy Warbucks and "Arf" said Sandy—her dog, of course. Her sponsor, Ovaltine, offered a de-coder ring with coupons. Mom said she couldn't afford it so every time they gave the current message, I felt so deprived because I couldn't de-code it. Years later, I found out most of the messages were like, "Be sure to drink your Ovaltine", **"Renfrew of the Mounted"** a Royal Canadian Mounted Policeman. The **"Lone Ranger"** with a Hi-O-Silver and his sidekick Tonto. Can you believe Tonto is currently played by Johnny Depp in a movie?



"Lux Theatre", directed by Cecil B. DeMille, who used movie scripts on the show. "Grand Central Station" another dramatic series, hosted at first by Don Ameche, who left to become a movie actor then replaced by his brother, Jim Ameche! Red Skelton's many comic characters were great. My own favorite was a "baaad little boy." "Fibber McGee" whose wife, Molly, tried hard to make him behave, but he never did clean up his closet. On every show, when he opened its door, the sound effects man got a real workout. Listeners admitted to having their own "McGee's Closet" at home. Bing Crosby was the first singer to be called a "crooner." He went on to prove himself a good actor in movies. How about the variety shows with Bob Hope, Jack

Benny and others? Major Bowes was popular with his amateur show, giving people the gong when they were bad. Even as a kid I felt they were chosen to be bad— the gong was good for a laugh each time.

Remember When It Was Fun To Be Scared?

Spooky "Lights Out" and "The Hermit" were

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my favorites. Altho they aired after my bedtime, luckily I could hear them in our one story home. (I had good ears then.) Scared, yes, but it was so good to snuggle down in your own safe bed and listen. Radios were certainly great for developing kids' imaginations! I still love my radio for news and political talk shows, and some of the music, especially golden oldies.
